

PREPOSITIONS

A preposition is a word or group of words that is used with a noun, pronoun, or noun phrase to show direction, location, or time, or to introduce an object. Additionally, prepositions are used to connect a noun or pronoun to a verb or adjective in a sentence. There are many prepositions in English and it can be difficult to learn how to use them. Choosing the correct preposition is often a matter of learning the relevant collocation.
