JCU's Psychology degrees provide excellent training in understanding human behaviour, analytic thinking and scientific research methods that are relevant to a broad range of careers.

The [Australian Psychological Society](#) describes what psychologists do as follows: "broadly speaking, most psychologists provide assessment and therapy to clients, help facilitate organisational or social change, conduct psychological research, or administer psychological tests to individuals or groups".

Careers

With or without registration, psychology graduates have a variety of career options.

Registered psychologists (6 years minimum – see diagram overleaf) can work in a range of employment settings. Many of these settings will also have options for graduates who choose not to become registered. The difference in offerings between registered and non-registered will depend on the employer and the role; some positions will be identified as "psychologist" and therefore needing registration, however in other positions, a "Human Services" type degree can be listed as desirable. Job titles might include: *caseworker, counsellor, support worker, child safety officer, project officer, disability support worker, drug and alcohol worker, intake officer.*

Employment settings include:

- Mental health and wellbeing
- Education and training
- Population health
- Drug and alcohol
- Justice and corrections
- Public policy
- Corporate and commercial
- Marketing and communication
- Emerging technology and design.

Psychologists who complete further post graduate studies can qualify for an *area of practice endorsement* in the following fields:

- Clinical neuropsychology
- Clinical psychology
- Community psychology
- Counselling psychology
- Educational and developmental psychology
- Forensic psychology
- Health psychology
- Organisational psychology
- Sport and exercise psychology

Employability through Volunteering

Gaining experience in psychological interventions can be difficult, however working with different client groups and building your communications skills as a volunteer is very achievable.

Think about areas of psychology that interest you most and seek out volunteer opportunities in that area. For example, if you're interested in working in health, you could volunteer at hospitals or with patient support groups. If you wish to develop your counselling skills you could volunteer as a [Lifeline Crisis Supporter](#) (Lifeline provides training). Other volunteer organisations are as follows:

Volunteering can give you more exposure to areas of professional interest, such as working with children, refugees, return to work

services, defence personnel, educational settings, etc.

It's also an opportunity to give to the community, grow your professional and community networks and demonstrate extra commitment to future employers and clients.

Overseas volunteering

Projects can be found by searching "psychology volunteering overseas". Many of these will be via companies that will organise your experience for a fee. Be aware that ethical issues surround some (but not all) so-called voluntourism projects.

To choose wisely, consider:

- What will be the outcome of my volunteering adventure?
- Am I doing it for the right reasons?
- What skills can I offer developing countries to empower their next generation to be self-sufficient?

Track Your Experience

As a psychologist, you'll need to track and reflect on your professional development for AHPRA registration by using professional association membership to identify development opportunities, so it's a good habit to get into right now and will help you write better job applications. Health services will often list values on their websites. They can be a useful guide for categorising experience to prove your suitability to their roles. For example, Townsville Hospitals' values* are:

Joining a Professional Association as a student member is an ideal way to gain valuable insight into your future profession, demonstrate interest and meet people in your field who can support you in developing your career and exploring career and employment opportunities. Use LinkedIn

LinkedIn is an important job search platform as recruiters and employers can actively seek out individuals as well as using intuitive advertising.

Investigate [JCU Alumni LinkedIn](#) profiles to identify career pathways and current and past employers of JCU psychology graduates.

Follow established psychologists in Townsville or other places. This is a great way to benefit from their posts without being connected. This is a great option if you haven't met in real life, or if you aren't yet confident enough to send a connection request.

Follow employers of choice and **industry bodies** to ensure you don't miss their updates and job listings, e.g. Queensland Health, Psychology Board, Beyond Blue, etc.

Use your Networks

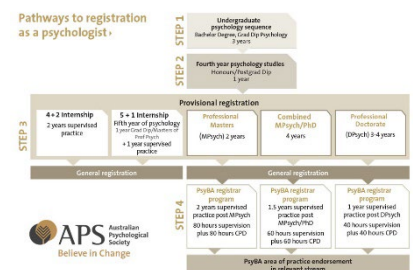
Keep in touch with supervisors from volunteering or work experience via LinkedIn or directly to ensure you're informed of job openings when they occur, or even before they are advertised.

JCU's Registration Pathways

To practice as a Psychologist you must be registered with the [Psychology Board of Australia](#).

Upon completion of the three year Bachelor Psychology degree a fourth year of study either via Honours (by invitation of Dean) or via a Graduate Diploma of Psychology is necessary to progress towards further study to achieve registered status.
